724 teams traveled to Houston, Texas, for the 25th Annual USA Junior Olympic Girls' Volleyball Championships. The championships were held from June 23-30 at the Reliant Center, hosted by the USA Volleyball with help from the Greater Houston Convention and Visitors Bureau.

For the first time, the Youth and Junior Olympic Volleyball (YJOV) Division voted to split the Club Division into the National and American Divisions, allowing for 152 additional teams to compete for a championship.

Teams qualified either through a national qualifier tournament or through the regions' bid tournaments (see the *Ohio Valley Region–Molten® 2004 National Bid Qualifier*, elsewhere in this issue). At-large bids for the Open Divisions were given to teams that did not win a bid at a qualifier but still proved to be among the best in the nation by finishing at the top of their divisions in national competitions.

The tournament consisted of more than 8,500 participants divided into Open, National, and American levels. The 12-13 Club and 14-15 Open, National, and American divisions competed on June 23-26, and the 16-18 Open, National, and American divisions competed on June 27-30.

The 2005 USA Junior Olympic Girls' Volleyball Championships will be held the Salt Palace in Salt Lake City, Utah, on June 29-July 6, and the 2005 USA Junior Olympic Girls' Invitatational Volleyball Championships will be held in Louisville, Kentucky, from June 30-July 3.

Invitational

The 3rd Annual USA Junior Olympic Girls' Volleyball Invitational was held in the Austin Convention Center in Austin, Texas, from June 24-27. The tournament was hosted by USA Volleyball, working with the Austin Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Teams that did not qualify for the *USA Junior Olympic Championships* in Houston were eligible for the *Invitational* based on their regional finishes.

The *Invitational* featured 6 age divisions ranging from 13-18. 200 teams competed in the 4-day tournament.

Of special note, *Mizuno Cincy Classics* – 14 Red and NKYVC – 14-1 Tsunami placed first and second, respectively, in the 14 National division. Team Atlantis VBC – 14 Elite seized victory in the 14 American division, and Premier Volleyball Club – 17-1 won the 17 American division.
